



# Assembly... Plus!

This pack is aimed at encouraging Year Six students to consider assembly themes in more depth.

We hope the ideas below will get your class thinking and talking about the topic.

## Lesson objective: reflect on how we can change the world for someone.

<p>Introduction: What needs to change?</p>	<p>Using the puppet script (see resource sheet), have two volunteers act it out or give out copies for all children to do in pairs. Discuss: Do you ever feel like Marigold? What things do you wish you could change about the world?</p>	
<p>Main: How can I change the world?</p>	<p>Watch the starfish video from assembly again. What situations in the world do you find overwhelming? Make a list of these and think of ways to start making the change with a small step. What could you do in your class, school, community to make things change? You could have a short class discussion, make posters of ideas for how children can make a change and display them in school, or maybe it will result in a Year 6 project throughout the school or community?</p> <p><b>“One person can’t change the world, but you can change the world for one person!”</b></p> <p>Reflect on this phrase that was used frequently in assembly. Has someone ever done something small that made a big difference to you? Share ideas. What small acts of kindness can you think of? Create a bank of ideas and create a display or acts of kindness box. Encourage children to try different ideas throughout the week and feed back at the end of the week to see what the impact was.</p>	<p>Watch the incoming video from assembly again. Display or give out the lyrics for the song That's How You Change The World (see resource sheet). Give children different paragraphs to read slowly and discuss with their partner, then feed back. Children could illustrate some of the song or create an uplifting poster using selected lyrics to encourage others to do the small acts of kindness that will change someone’s world. They could add a prayer to their poster and you could display these around school.</p> <p>Ask children to find the parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10, v25-37 (or use resource sheet). Children could retell or rewrite the parable in their own words, complete a storyboard (see resource sheet) or create their own dramatic version similar to the one they saw in assembly. Encourage them to use the details from the text rather than inventing their own ideas.</p>
<p>Plenary: YOU can change the world for one person</p>	<p>Show PPT (see online resources folder) of inspirational quotes about changing the world. You could discuss each one as a class and what it means to them, or just read them quietly for some personal reflection.</p> <p>Encourage children to do something this week that will change the world for one person.</p>
